INTRODUCING ZENA (ZENEBECH) BUNGUL

How long have you been working at Albany Hills State School?

I have been working at Albany Hills State School as a cleaner for one year.

You are originally from Ethiopia. When did you move to Australia?

I arrived in Australia on 23 August 2000 on a humanitarian visa. Before coming to Australia, I spent nine years living as a refugee in Kenya.

My story began in Ethiopia, where I owned a small coffee shop. It was there that I met my husband, who was fighting for South Sudan's freedom. We started our family in Ethiopia, but in 1991, war forced us to flee our home.

At the time, I was seven months pregnant with our second child and we had a two-year-old son. We had to leave very quickly. Our journey to South Sudan took about a month on foot.

Life in South Sudan was extremely difficult. For a month we had no food, no shelter and very few possessions. It was the rainy season, and the only protection we had was a small plastic sheet. Under that shelter, I gave birth to my daughter. We created a simple space for our family, but it was very basic.

The Red Cross was able to deliver aid. However, because there was no airport and the rain made access difficult, food had to be dropped from planes. Unfortunately, some people were injured when supplies landed among the crowds waiting below.

In May 1992, fighting escalated again in South Sudan. My daughter was nine months old and my son was three years old. My husband returned to the front lines, leaving me to care for our children.

When the fighting began in our area, we had to run for our lives. We fled through the bush, carrying the children and trying to stay alive. A relative's son helped me with my three-year-old while I carried my baby daughter. We ran for hours. We became lost and had very little with us. I had no shoes, and our feet bled as we ran. Along the way we passed injured and dying friends and family members. We could not stop because survival depended on continuing forward.

Finding water was another challenge. We dug into the sand to reach water beneath the surface. It was gritty and dirty, but we were desperately thirsty.

Eventually, we reached a nearby city. There, I sold some jewellery to buy food and water. We stayed until June 1992, when fighting spread into that area as well. Once again, we were forced to leave.

During this journey, I met a ten-year-old boy named Jockb, who had lost his parents in the war. I took him in and cared for him as one of my own children.

In July 1992, we arrived in Kenya and lived in a refugee camp. I remained there for nine years with my children and Jockb. My husband was able to visit us from the war zone in 1993 and again in 1994.

Sadly, that was the last time I saw him. I later learned that he had been killed during the fighting.

After nine years in a refugee camp, my children, Jockb and I were given the opportunity to come to Australia. We arrived in August 2000 and began building a new life.

Since arriving in Australia, my children have completed school and gone on to further study at university and TAFE. Jockb, whom I raised as my son, completed a degree in International Relations at QUT. He is now happily married and has three children of his own.

I am very grateful to be in Australia. Giving back to the community is important to me, which is why we support people experiencing homelessness through Kulture Bridge. We hope to grow our organisation so we can also help women in need.

Our dream is to one day open a community restaurant where the profits are reinvested into helping people who need support.

What do you miss most about Ethiopia?

I miss my family and the church community. Before the wars, people in Ethiopia would gather at church every morning. It was a wonderful way to stay connected with one another and support the community.

What are some of the main differences between Albany Hills and Ethiopian schools?

Students at Albany Hills have access to many resources and opportunities.

In Ethiopia, many students walk up to two hours to get to school and another two hours to get home. They often have limited access to books, computers and other learning resources.

Another difference is that students cannot move to the next year level unless they pass their assessments and exams. If they do not pass, they repeat the year. This applies from primary school right through to Year 12, which means students of different ages can often be found in the same class.

What do you like most about working at Albany Hills?

The staff are wonderful and it is a very supportive community. The students are respectful and friendly. I enjoy being part of such a welcoming school community.

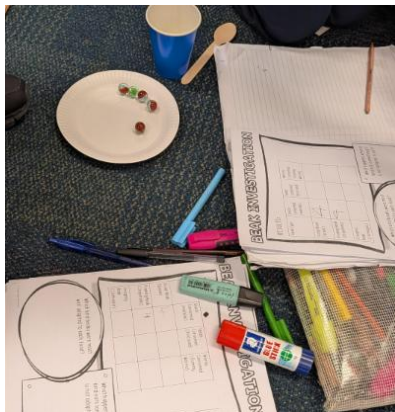

It was an amazing night overall and got to meet a lot of new people. I also got to learn how to use the Square for EFTPOS payments. We raised a total of \$423 for the RSPCA to help animals in need.

ANIMAL ADAPTATIONS

In science this term, Year 5 has been learning about animal adaptations, mainly about structural adaptations and behavioural adaptations. A structural adaptation is a physical characteristic or a body part of an organism to help it survive in the harsh environments.



However, a behavioural adaptation can be instinctual, learned or both. A behavioural adaptation can also be what an animal learned overtime to survive or keep out of sight from predators. We also did a combined lesson with 5NM and 5AM where we learned about bird beaks. More specifically the "Darwins Finch", within the lesson we had some experiments. We investigated 3 fascinating beaks. First the long slender beak represented by a pair of chopsticks that a hummingbird and other beautiful birds have, the long slender beak allows the hummingbird to probe deep into flowers for nectar, allowing them to access resources that other birds can't. Secondly, the large grasping beak represented by a small wooden clothes peg is a crucial tool for birds that rely on hunting and gathering food. The beak is designed to be a strong and capable of gripping prey. Lastly, the broad scooping beak represented by a small wooden spoon serves the purpose of enabling birds to scoop up food from water or

mud, like the White pelican and spoonbills has the beak to filter fish from the water, showing the adaptability and efficiency of how this bird evolved in responses to its food source and climate across the archipelago known as the Galapagos Islands.

COMPOSTING

Everyday our year five students take care of our school composting buckets. Our job involves placing the composting bucket out each morning in an eating area, sometimes supervising the buckets at break times and cleaning out the buckets daily.

It is important to make sure you are helping by putting the correct food in the composting buckets. The correct food to go into the buckets includes fruit scraps, veggie scraps, eggshells and tea bags. Everything else like dairy products, plastic wrappers or meat need to go in the general waste bins. Don't forget to put your poppers and milk bottles into the containers for change bucket.

It is important to recycle and compost whenever we can to keep our planet healthy.
