The benefits of joining dance club are that you can make new friends, feel more confident, be creative and stay fit all while having fun. Hope to see you there.



Families for Inclusive Education











The <u>Families for Inclusive Education (FFIE) Project</u> helps families develop a clear vision for their child's school years, learn about inclusive education policies and supports, and develop advocacy skills and peer support networks.

In its sixth year, this is an initiative of Community Resource Unit Ltd (CRU). For more than 35 years CRU has worked to promote positive change so that people with disabilities can belong to and participate in community life.

THIS PROJECT:

- helps families develop communication and advocacy skills so they can work effectively with their child's school,
- builds families' confidence and support networks so they can sustain their efforts as valued partners in their child's education,
- provides information and resourcing to service providers including local schools.

WHAT DOES THE PROJECT OFFER:

<u>Full-day, face-to- face Workshops</u>: "Inclusion and belonging at the local school: The parent advocacy tool-kit" This workshop features new and updated content and will be provided across South-East Qld and regional areas throughout 2024.

Participants will learn about:

- Knowing your child's gifts and setting a vision for inclusion success
- Embracing your role as an advocate
- What authentic inclusion in the regular class looks like
- Education laws, policies and supports
- Speaking positively and confidently to work collaboratively with the school
- Advocacy tips to stay strong and effective
